Re: Covid-19 State of Emergency Updates

The purpose of this memo is to disperse all the recently released guidance and recension of many mandates and allowable scopes of practice:

To summarize:

Effective March 1, 2023, EMS personnel can no longer care for patients at static sites. The following are the settings in which EMS personnel can care for patients:

- at the scene of an emergency,
- · during transport to a general acute care hospital,
- during interfacility transfer.
- while in the Emergency Department of a general acute care hospital, until care responsibility is assumed by the regular staff at the hospital, or
- during training within the facilities of a participating general acute care hospital.

Approved local optional scope of practices (LOSOPs) for EMS personnel to administer vaccinations and testing will remain in effect within the above-noted environments.

 Currently there are no EMS personnel in Tuolumne County that completed the trainings and submitted documentation to the EMS agency to administer vaccination and/or testing for patients.

2. Personal Protective Equipment

- a. Beginning April 3, 2023, masks will no longer be required in indoor high-risk and health care settings. This includes health care, long-term care, and correctional facilities as well as homeless, emergency, and warming and cooling centers.
 - i. CDPH recommends wearing a mask when community spread levels are medium and high for the above listed high-risk settings.

- b. Healthcare facilities may have policies that differ from above. In the event that a responder is informed that a facility requires masking, responders shall comply with facility policies.
- c. Agencies should review the new Cal-OSHA COVID-19 Non-Emergency Regulations guidelines regarding masking and testing. These regulations will be in effect until February 2025.
