

## **Dambacher Detention Center**



This newly built facility opened its doors to hold inmates January of 2021.


The DDC is an Adult detention facility that holds up to 240 inmates.

The facility holds both sentenced and unsentenced inmates of all genders.

Current inmates have been charged with Felony or Misdemeanor charges or they are Civil offenders.

## **Primary Duties of a Jail Deputy**

Jail Deputies duties at intake include searching new arrestees, secures and inventories all property, collects fingerprints for identity






DDC Deputies work closely with other agencies while processing inmates and assist in booking.

Working in the housing units




As a Deputy, you will monitor inmate safety and wellbeing. Ensuring protection of inmate rights. This includes inmate court appearances and medical appointments.

You will maintain a variety of records and activity logs during shift. You will supervise and monitor inmates in tasks such as: facility maintenance, meal preparation, laundry, and recreation time.

You will write incident reports and testify in court as subpoenaed.







## **Jail Deputy Sheriff Recruit Training**

Recruit Deputies receive 12 weeks of in-house training with various Corporals and Training Officers.

Recruit Deputies are sent out of county to attend a 6-Week Adult Corrections (CORE) Academy within the first year of employment.

Recruits have a mandatory one-year probationary period.





## **Special Assignments**

#### **Classification Deputy**

-Interviews, classifies, and assigns detention areas to inmates based on multiple issues.

#### **Transportation Deputy**

-Transport's inmates and maintains custody for hospital, court and related appointments, and transports to other facilities.

#### **Work Crew Deputy**

-Supervises and monitors inmate trustees in a working capacity.





## **Frequently Asked Questions**

#### Will I have to work overtime?

Currently we are working at minimum staffing levels. This means if someone calls in sick or is on vacation someone else will have to cover that position on an overtime basis.

#### Will I have to carry a gun?

There are no firearms allowed within the DDC, however, every uniformed member of the Tuolumne County Sheriff's Office, including jail personnel, is required to be trained under Section 832 of the Penal Code. They are required to qualify with a firearm and maintain their qualification while employed by the Sheriff's Office.

#### Will I have to work at night?

The DDC operates 24 hours a day, seven days a week. You will be required to work a shift that is part of the normal rotation of all jail personnel. Typically, a new person will work on a graveyard team until they achieve enough seniority to move to a dayshift or special assignment.

### Will I get specific break and lunch times?

The Department Policy authorizes break and lunch periods. In all reality breaks and lunch times will be granted as time allows. Therefore, there is no set time for breaks. Personnel do not leave the building for meals, however, there is meal service provided at not cost to the employee.

# Will there be times when I have to physically control or restrain inmates?

As Jail Deputies we are required to maintain control of an inmate at all times. There will be incidents when physical contact with an inmate is necessary. Weaponless defense, arrest and control techniques are taught to Jail Deputies.

## Will I be exposed to communicable disease?

Jail staff is trained to use universal precautions when dealing directly with inmates. Protective gloves, and proper PPE are provided.
